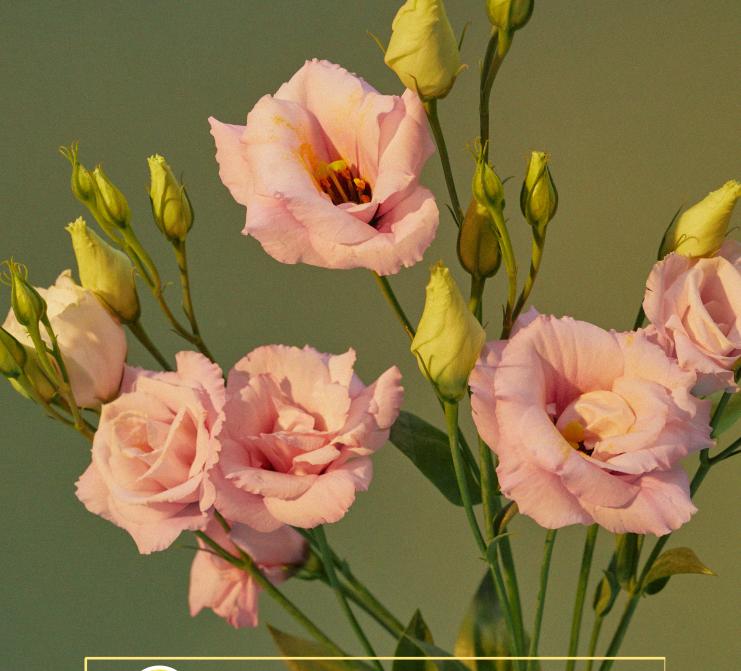

Spotlight

Sutanu Sur The recent Grammy awards, held on Sunday, February 5, 2024, highlighted the

Indian classical tabla maestro Padma Vibushan 'Ustad' Zakir Hussain, who was awarded 3 Grammy awards for his collaborations with two different Indian and fusion instrumental groups. These awards are helping to highlight the principal Indian percussion instrument, the Tabla. The Fox Cities community is fortunate to have a distinguished tabla artist who has been performing in similar collaborative musical groups including the full Western Symphony Orchestra and Choir. Sutanu Sur, who has been part of the Fox Valley Community for the past 10

years, is a Software Engineer.



He was born in the suburbs of Kolkata, West Bengal, India. Sur's father encouraged him to learn and enjoy Indian Classical music through live concerts. He started to learn the tabla at the early age of 5. His formal training happened with Pandit Sukumar Maitra in the Guru-Shishya tradition. He continued advanced learning through the training of legendary Tabla Maestro Pandit Swapan Chaudhuri.

Playing the tabla requires extensive training and involves the use of the fingers and palm to create a wide variety of sounds and rhythms. Tabla compositions are mathematically framed within the structure of the Taal. Sur had the opportunity to collaborate with the Lawrence Orchestra and Choir when he performed Reena Esmail's composition, "This Love Between Us: Prayers for Unity" last spring. Sur's most recent performances include collaboration with Fox Valley Symphony Orchestra, Fox Valley Sinfonia, Make Music Day celebrations at Fox Cities Performing Arts Center, Green Lake Festival of Music, IndUS of Fox Valley, Consulate General of India, Chicago. The collaboration as a featured guest artist with the Fox Valley Symphony Orchestra has been awarded the prestigious 2023 American Prize for Orchestral Performance (Professional Division).

Sur highlighted the challenge of playing the tabla in an orchestral setting, explaining that he was accustomed to playing without sheet music. The rest of the orchestra has written music and knows when the other symphony instruments are joining the music and stopping, while the tabla had no written sheet music as it is expected to be improvised along with fitting the right tempo and time signature that matches with the Taal. He had to learn how to interplay with the orchestra instruments, similarly, the other instruments had to learn how to play in harmony with him.

Sur is looking forward to his upcoming performances where he will be the featured guest Tabla Artist collaborating with the Atlanta Master Chorale. These performances are scheduled at the Schwartz Center for Performing Arts in Atlanta, Georgia on March 15th and 16th, 2024. He will also be featured with the Music Institute of Chicago concert at the Nichols Concert Hall, Evanston, IL on May 18th, 2024.

Besides Sur's featured Tabla performances, he plays a key role in bringing in diversity and inclusion. He joined the Justice Equity Diversity Inclusion committee within the board of Fox Valley Symphony Orchestra. This is the newest committee that focuses on bringing the community together in new and creative ways through the music and the stage that builds bridges and communicates together. He is also a member of the Diversity Alliance committee at the Percussive Arts Society. He has been invited to the judging panel of various international music competitions to share his expertise like the Charleston International Music Competition. He is focused on bringing Tabla learning accessible to this part of the country. He inspires students to take up the Tabla as an amazing instrument not only enhancing their musical skills but also analytical/logical skills.

Introducing the Illuminating Woman

Sridevi Buddi, a well-known non-profit leader, began her life journey in India. She was raised in a multi-generational family that prioritized education, spirituality, and exercise: competitive tennis and yoga. Her parents instilled empathy and a commitment to community service through their various projects in India, imbibing her with these values early on.



Sri's academic journey was promising as she pursued a Ph.D. in Efficient Market Hypothesis while teaching MBA students at Osmania University in Hyderabad, India.

Awarded with the prestigious Junior Research Fellowship (JRF) and Assistant Professorship through the National Eligibility Test conducted by the University Grants Commission (UGC), she became the youngest 'Reader/Assistant Professor' at Osmania University.

Sri's career underwent a major transformation when she moved to the US to support her husband's career aspirations. Transitioning from business academia to accounting and later to the nonprofit sector, she gracefully adapted to shifting continents and new family priorities. Her resilience wasn't just an adaptation to her new environment, but an acceptance of the United States as an integral part of her identity alongside her Indian roots.

Sridevi currently serves as the Vice Chair of the Steering Council for the Nonprofit Leadership Initiative (NPLI) by the Community Foundation for the Fox Valley. NPLI trains and provides necessary networking for the efficient functioning of nonprofits. She plays diverse roles in the community serving as the Governance Chair of IndUS of the Fox Valley, Secretary of Leonardo da Vinci School for Gifted Learners PTO, Interact Chair for Rotary District 6220, and Board Member of the Rotary Club of Appleton.

Recognizing the challenge of limited resources faced by nonprofits, Sri initiated successful collaborations with like-minded organizations to share resources and jointly achieve goals. An exemplary collaboration is 'Rhythms of the World,' involving IndUS of Fox Valley, Appleton Rotary, Building for Kids, Appleton Public Library, City of Appleton, and Downtown Inc. This initiative, conceived in 2017, expanded to include 13 sponsoring organizations by 2023, showcasing the rich cultural tapestry of the Fox Cities community through music and dance.

It comes as no surprise that Sri's impactful contributions garnered her recognition in Juliane Troicki and Laura Schneider's 'Illuminating Women Project', showcased at the Trout Museum from January 12 to May 12, 2024, sponsored by Kimberly Clark. The masterminds behind this two-year project chose remarkable women from diverse areas of the Fox Cities community. Featured along with Sridevi Buddi are other inspirational women like the Appleton Chief of Police, a Holocaust survivor, a lady pastor, a poet, an empowerment coach, a flight nurse, and so on.

In the words of Sri, "The exhibit recognizes women and highlights accomplishments that might remain invisible. The vision and work of biographer Juliane Troicki and artistic photographer Laura Schneider are empowering as well as heartwarming. I am humbled to be included among the 30 'Illuminating Women'. I am but a representation of the many persevering women, who give genially to their families and community while overcoming various challenges."

Sri has been inspired by Dr. Sandhya Sridhar and Mrs. Kamal Varma at IndUS, mentored by Dr. Sridhar Balakuntalam at Rotary, and trained by the nonprofit guru Ms. Nancy Heykes at NPLI. In her pursuit, she seeks to embody the generosity and positivity exemplified by her mother. She takes pride in her father's commitment to community service and his resilience in changing his career path from law to agriculture to honor his mother's sentiments after the sudden passing of his father.

She emphasized the need for self-care while we juggle our multiple roles in life, "Wear your oxygen mask so that you can help others wear theirs!"—a principle she hopes to better incorporate into her own life. To young aspiring girls, Sri offers timeless advice in positivity: "Focus on your goals and work hard to achieve them. Do not resent others' success, because you will receive yours when it is due. When you finally realize your dreams, stay grounded!"

Sridevi Buddi leads by example that service is a truly rewarding experience. Sri's self-motivation shined through as she enthused, "Sometimes, it's the work itself that gives me so much contentment that I want to do more, it has been a growing passion since 2008!" Lawrence Memorial Chapel presents five-time Grammy Award-winner Ustad Zakir Hussain on April 6, 2024. The tabla virtuoso is accompanied by Sabir Khan on sarangi (a bowed, short-necked three-stringed instrument) and Debopriya Chatterjee on bansuri (a flute-like instrument composed of a single hollow shaft of bamboo with seven finger holes). Sarangi and bansuri have their roots in ancient Indian mythology and as folk instruments.

The excitement to have three Indian Classical maestros present in Northeast Wisconsin sharing their performances is going to be incredible. 'Ustad' Zakir Hussain (born 9 March 1951) not only is a world-celebrated Indian tabla player, but also a renowned composer, music producer, and actor. Mickey Hart, the percussionist of the Grateful Dead invited Hussain for a special album called Planet Drum, which featured drummers from different parts of the world. Planet Drum, released in 1991, received a Grammy for Best World Music Album in 1992. Another collaboration between Hart and Hussain resulted in the Global Drum Project. They teamed up with the Latin Jazz percussionist Giovanni Hidalgo and the Nigerian percussionist and recording artist, Sikiru Adepoju. The Global Drum Project convened some of the world's finest drum talent which was released by Shout! Factory in 2007. The Global Drum Project Grammy received а 2009 in Contemporary World Music Album.

Transcending many music genres, Hussain has worked together with Shakti, Remember Shakti, Masters of Percussion, Diga, Tabla Beat Science, and Sangam. Hussain has recorded live with the Detroit Symphony in a dynamic three-movement composition for banjo (Bela Fleck), double bass (Edgar Meyer), and tabla (Zakir Hussain) called The Melody of Rhythms: Concerto. The concert combined Indian Classical rhythms with American melodies. There are many notable works of Hussain in Indian Classical music. He was an associate music director with Richard Robbin for the movie Heat and Dust in 1973. Hussain won the Global Music Performance, The Contemporary Instrumental Album, and Instrumental Composition Grammies in 2024.

Debopriya Chatterjee is a popular female flautist from India. She studied world music at the Rotterdam Conservatory in 1998. She was privileged to be trained under the tutelage of Pandit Bholanath Prasanna during her teenage years and later with guru Pandit Hariprasad

Chaurasia. She has had the honor & privilege of accompanying her guru on stage for various prestigious concerts in India and abroad. She has been awarded with the "Rashtriya"

Kumar Gandharwa Puraskar" in the year 2020, She will be playing bansuri, an Indian flute.

Sabir Khan is a sought-after young musician who plays sarangi, a bowed instrument. This instrument is known for holding the sound closest to the human voice. He belongs to Sikar Gharana of Rajasthan, India. His great grandfather 'Ustad' Azim Khan was a court musician in Sikar and his father, Padam Bhushan (an Indian State Honor) 'Ustad' Sultan Khan is an acclaimed sarangi player. Sabir is known to have great mastery over his technique that combines both rhythm and notes. He has accompanied many accomplished musicians and artists like Zakir Hussain, Pandit Birju Maharaj, 'Ustad' Rashid Khan, Lata Mangeshkar, and Asha Bhosle.

Festival of Colors, Holi





Spring reminds us of flowers, herbs, and sunshine. It is a time for new blossoms, festivities, and celebrations. Holi is a festival of colors that celebrates the end of winter and the arrival of spring in India. The festival is based on the Hindu lunar calendar so the exact date changes each year but it usually takes place in February or March. This year, it will take place on March 25.

Holi is predominantly celebrated in India but the display of colors has spread to many different places around the world without religious boundaries. Throwing colored powder and dancing to music is one of the biggest parts of the festival, inviting positive and joyful spirits. The colored powder used during Holi is called Gulal. Originally, this was made naturally out of pigments from plants or fruits. To create red and orange pigments, flowers are used from the Palash tree, native to South Asia. Yellow comes from the turmeric plant, also known as haldi. Dark blue or indigo colors come from Indian berries or grapes.

Holi has gained popularity across the US, especially in big cities. In New York, there are many parades, fashion shows, and concerts that fuse original Holi traditions with newer American culture. One big event is The Color Run, which is a running race that involves throwing colors at runners as they complete the race. This tradition focuses on physical fitness as part of a fun community activity. It creates positive energy amongst everyone and ultimately brings people together.

Festival of Colors



Holika Dahan precedes Holi and will take place this year on March 24, one day before Holi. The Hindu mythological significance dates back to the 4th century. Hiranyakashyap, a demon king wanted everyone to worship him as a god.

His own son Prahlad, a devotee of Lord Vishnu refused to accept his father's beliefs. tyrannical Out of anger, Hiranyakashyap ordered his sister, Holika, to kill Prahlad. A boon had granted Holika immunity from fire. She tried to trick Prahlad into sitting with her in a pyre. She brought Prahlad into the fire expecting him to die, but instead, Holika was burned to ashes and Prahlad survived. Shortly afterward, Hiranyakashyap was also slayed by Lord Vishnu, representing a victory of good over evil.



To celebrate this victory, traditions include lighting bonfires to symbolize the burning of negative emotions and evil thoughts. The celebrations include dressing up in traditional clothing while singing songs and reciting prayers.

Both Holi and Holika Dahan spread positivity and unite people together. Differences aside, many people enjoy this event because it brings about love and energy through a festival of colors.

Holi: Food Recipes

Thandai is a popular beverage in northern states of India, made during the Holi festival. It is made with cooling spices, seed nuts, rose petals, and milk.

Ingredients

- 3 tablespoons almonds
- 2 heaped tablespoons pistachios
- 2 tablespoons white poppy seeds
- 1/4 cup melon seeds
- 2 tablespoons dried rose petals
- 1 tablespoon fennel seeds
- ½ teaspoons whole black peppercorns
- ½ cup sugar
- 3-4 green cardamom
- 15-18 strands of saffron
- 1 cup of milk

How to make Thandai

- 1. Begin by filling a bowl with warm water and adding almonds, pistachios, poppy seeds, melon seeds, rose petals, fennel seeds, and black peppercorns to the bowl.
- 2. Combine the ingredients in the water and allow them to soak for 1-2 hours.
- 3. Transfer the soaked ingredients along with sugar, cardamom, saffron, and black peppercorns into a blender.
- 4. Grind the ingredients into a fine paste, and if not using immediately, cover and refrigerate.
- 5. Take 4 scoops of the paste and place them in a glass, then add 1 glass of milk.
- 6.Mix the contents thoroughly, garnish with chopped almonds and rose petals, and savor the delightful concoction.

Health Benefits of Thandai

Thandai, a renowned beverage associated with Holi celebrations, is not only delightful but also provides a multitude of health benefits owing to its natural ingredients and distinctive cooling properties. Almonds in Thandai provide proteins, healthy fats, and essential vitamins like E and B2, enhancing skin health, heart function, and energy levels. The inclusion of milk contributes to calcium and vitamin D, promoting strong bones and teeth. Nuts in Thandai improve digestion, while fennel seeds' anti-inflammatory properties alleviate gastric issues. The combination of seeds and nuts boosts energy levels, supporting an active lifestyle. Saffron promotes hair growth and, potentially prevents hair loss.



Holi: Food Recipes



Puran Poli is a flatbread stuffed with sweet lentil (Indian name: Chana Dal) stuffing. In the Marathi language, the sweet stuffing is known as Puran, and the flatbread is called Poli.

Ingredients - 4 Serving

- 1 cup chana dal
- 2 tablespoons ghee
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon refined oil
- 1 cup powdered jaggery
- 1 teaspoon powdered green cardamom
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg powder
- 1/4 teaspoon turmeric
- 1/4 cup water, salt as required
- pinch of saffron (optional)



How to make Puran Poli

Step 1: Cook Chana dal

- 1. Rinse one cup of chana dal thoroughly and soak it in water for 30 minutes to one hour.
- 2.Cook the soaked dal in a pressure cooker with 3 cups of water, allowing it to whistle 4 to 5 times.
- 3. After cooking, let the pressure cooker release the pressure naturally.
- 4. Strain the cooked dal, ensuring it is drained thoroughly.
- 5. The resulting dal stock can be used for preparing soups or as a base for various curry dishes.

Step 2: Prepare the filling for Puran Poli

- 1. Place a saucepan over medium heat and add ghee to it. Allow the ghee to melt.
- 2. Once the ghee is melted, add the strained dal to the saucepan.
- 3. Roast the dal for 2-3 minutes, then add jaggery, cardamom powder, nutmeg powder, and a pinch of saffron.
- 4. Mix all the ingredients thoroughly and cook on low heat until the mixture becomes dry.
- 5. Turn off the flame and let the mixture cool.
- 6.Mash the dal using a masher, ensuring no chana dal is left unmashed in the stuffing. This step is crucial for rolling out thin Puran Polis.

Step 3: Knead the dough

- 1. In a dough-kneading plate, combine all-purpose flour, turmeric, salt to taste, and refined oil.
- 2.Mix the ingredients well, and then gradually add a little water at a time while kneading to form a stiff dough.
- 3. Divide the dough into 4 parts and set it aside. Ensure that the dough is smooth and soft, and let it rest for 15 to 20 minutes.

Step 4: Make Puran Polis

- 1. Take one part of the dough and roll it into a 2 to 3-inch circle.
- 2. Place a portion of the Puran Poli mixture in the center of the rolled dough.
- 3. Close and shape it again into a ball.
- 4. Sprinkle flour and start rolling the dough.

Step 5: Cook the Puran Polis

Put a tawa on medium flame and place the roti on it. Add 1/2 teaspoon ghee and cook well from both sides. Serve hot or pair with milk or ghee.

Health Benefits of Puran Poli

- 1. Protein Powerhouse: Chana dal, a key ingredient, is a rich source of protein, crucial for tissue repair, muscle building, and overall growth and development.
- 2. Essential Nutrients: The diverse ingredients in Puran Poli contribute essential minerals and vitamins such as iron, calcium, and B vitamins, supporting overall health.
- 3. Balanced Energy: The combination of proteins and complex carbohydrates in Puran Poli offers sustained energy, preventing abrupt blood sugar spikes.
- 4. Antioxidant Spice Blend: Spices like cardamom and nutmeg in Puran Poli possess antioxidant properties, aiding the body's defense against oxidative stress.
- 5. Natural Sweetness with Jaggery: The use of jaggery as a natural sweetener in Puran Poli offers sweetness without the adverse effects of refined sugar, making it a healthier option for those managing their sugar levels.

Dhol Tasha



While visiting Maharashtra (a state in India), you may be entertained by Dhol-Tasha performances, especially during the festival season. You will surely experience the most uplifting, enthralling, and rhythmic sounds from Dhol-Tasha performances. These performances are played out in the cities in large groups for hours on end. They are always one of the highlights of the festivities, especially during the Ganesh Festival. The sound invokes strong emotions of awe and excitement both for the participants and the large crowds that gather to experience it.

A typical Dhol-Tasha performance features two types of instruments: the Dhol and the Tasha. They may be accompanied by Zanj, Taal, and Lezim. Saffron-colored Dhwaj (Flags) are often flown during these performances, as they are typically associated with religious events.

A Dhol is a large metal drum that produces a deep bass sound and is played with a short wooden stick called a tipri. The Tasha, on the other hand, is also a metal drum but produces a sharp-pitched sound and is played with two long flexible sticks. Zanj and Taal consist of two small metal discs that produce a metallic pitched sound. Lezim, a string of small metal discs strung together, is used while dancing to the Dhol-Tasha rhythm.

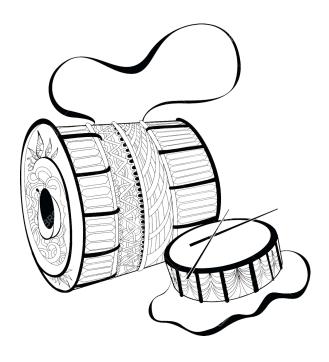


Dhol Tasha



The Dhol-Tasha tradition exemplifies inclusiveness. People from all ages, genders, and different walks of life join to create a rhythmic ensemble (or pathak) here in the Fox Cities community. The group known as the "Swarajya Dhol Tasha Pathak" dedicated to practicing and showcasing this beautiful tradition. But the real purpose goes far beyond that. The Pathak was formed to create a sense of belonging, a channel for learning the art of rhythm, gain discipline, and invoke spiritual respect through these instruments.

Every week, the Pathak gather to practice various elements of this tradition for several hours. Even though practicing in the Pathak requires an immense amount of physical and mental energy, the belief that playing the instruments is a spiritual experience makes every participant endure it with a smile on their face. Playing it with a group makes it immensely powerful and satisfying. That is the magic of Dhol-Tasha, once the rhythm takes over, your mind, body, and soul are all aligned in perfect sync.

Pathak's journey includes practicing the tradition of Dhol-Tasha and building healthy experiences through performances at festivals and other public events.

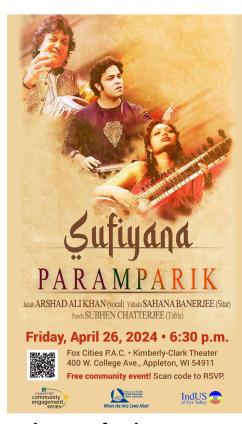

In September 2020, Mayor Jake Woodford of Appleton approved plans for a library building project. The old library wasn't big enough for the growing population, so the city decided to expand it. The construction contract was given to Skidmore, Owings & Merill, a highly acclaimed firm with over 2000 awards. The expansion will increase the building's size from 85,500 to 94,000 square feet. Specific spaces for children and teens will be added, like the Flexbox for hands-on learning and the Learning Stairs for trips and meetings. Community rooms, conference rooms, and co-working spaces will also be part of the renovations. The new building will be more eco-friendly with solar panels, a geothermal system, and more natural light. A special spot called The Bluff with a skylight will be a cozy space for children to read and families to enjoy the library.

After awarding the construction contract to Skidmore, Owings & Merill. there continuous were improvements in the architectural designs and features for the new expansion. This design development phase lasted for several months. In early 2022, preparations for the temporary setup of a new location began, and the move was completed on May 23, 2022.



The Boldt Company (Boldt) is overseeing the construction of the new library renovations, ensuring that any items to be discarded are handled sustainably and safely. Old wood and metal that can no longer be used are being recycled, while bricks and concrete are crushed and repurposed as road-based material. As of January 2024, more than 355,305 pounds of waste materials have been recycled. Construction is ongoing, with the project anticipated to be completed by early 2025. The improved building will undoubtedly become a wonderful space for people of all ages to enjoy learning and reading in a welcoming environment. It's something everyone is eagerly anticipating.

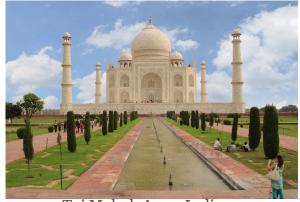


Visiting India, a large, fascinating, and incredibly diverse country.

religions, and cultures is fascinating whether one contemplates the Hindus, Muslims, Christians, Sikhs, Buddhists, or Jains. As for the stunning architecture, it is amazing, being rooted in its history, culture, and religion.

In fact, the architecture alone is worth a visit to India. The exquisite beauty of the Taj Mahal mausoleum in Agra, a UNESCO World Heritage Centre, is a world wonder and remains one of India's spectacular architectural most creations. So too, the Golden Temple of Amritsar, which has a glittering golden dome and is built on marble, combines Islamic and Hindu architecture. It is one of the holiest sites in Sikhism and is truly a gorgeous structure. In general, the scenery in India is magnificent.I clearly remember the vast Ladakh mountain ranges and the multicolored rock formations we saw on our hike, as well as the spectacular gorges and dramatic terrain crowned by the soaring peaks of the Himalayas, clad with ice.

During our trek, we were accompanied by an experienced trekking guide, cook, and several experienced porters, as well as ponies to carry luggage, tents, and food supplies. Since our goal was to hike in the Himalayas, including the Ladakh region which borders Tibet in India's far north, we knew there was a big risk involved due to the high altitude.

Understandably, our guides required us to slowly acclimatize ourselves over three days by hiking each day at a lower level and ensuring we were adequately hydrated. We started in Srinagar, the capital of Kashmir, and slowly made our way to the higher mountains. I cannot recall the exact route we took in getting to Leh, the capital of Ladakh, but I can distinctly remember how unpredictable the weather could be, especially in terms of temperature extremes. From Leh, we went to Amritsar, before heading back to Delhi and then home.

There are, however, other risks involved when traveling around India. In our 2011 trip, for example, when we were riding our ponies as part of a multi-day journey in Kashmir, our Indian guides informed us of the potential danger of being where we were at the time. This was due to border skirmishes between India and Pakistan.

My scariest experience in India, however, occurred in 2011, when we found ourselves at 15,000 feet above sea level, in the Himalayas. Eunice, David, and I were riding ponies-accompanied by our Indian tour guides – through narrow mountain passes in a single-file line. We came to a narrow bend with a bottomless chasm to one side, when another party of tourists and their guides suddenly appeared at the other end of the bend, heading towards us. A misstep by any of the ponies, or a careless move by a rider having vertigo, could result in falling thousands of feet to one's death.

Fortunately, the other party managed to slowly back up their ponies without any problems, thus permitting us to proceed.

For me, however, the most significant and enduring of all memories of my trips to India is a spiritual one. As an observant Jew, I am required by God to keep His commandments (mitzvot) of wearing a Tallis and putting on Tefillin every day except Saturday and certain Jewish Holidays. The Tallis is a Jewish prayer shawl and Tefillin refers to Jewish phylacteries. These consist of two small leather boxes attached to leather straps. Each box contains four sections of the Torah painstakingly inscribed parchment. Observant Jews believe that when Tefillin is put on, both a spiritual and physical bond is formed with God; physical in the sense of literally binding the symbol of God's love to our bodies. I recall how moved I was standing out in

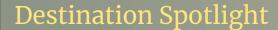

To me, it looked like a much smaller and colorless version of Yellowstone National Park. There was steam all right, but it stank of Sulphur. It is also known for its mud spa. We dipped our feet in the mud and let little fishies do pedicures the natural way. They attacked callouses on our feet and we emerged with smoother, shinier feet.

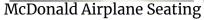

The only other experience that topped it all was a helicopter ride over Franz Josef glaciers in the western part of the island. Named after a German-born New Zealand explorer. It was thrilling to fly over a very bright, white, sunny landscape. I dared not take my sunglasses off. The helicopter landed and we even got to frolic in the snow for fifteen-twenty minutes. The snow was just an inch deep covering the surface of hard ice. I scratched the names of my dear ones and took the pictures as souvenirs.

It can answer questions, admit mistakes, challenge incorrect ideas, and reject inappropriate requests. But how does it answer questions so well? ChatGPT is a large language model (LLM) that has learned a lot about language through massive amounts of training data and machine learning.

Large language models are essential in applications like chatbots and translation. They are advancing AI by generating realistic and relevant text for various tasks. This is done through conditional text generation, where the model responds based on a given prompt. ChatGPT, for example, can talk about ancient civilizations or programming languages.

However, training models like ChatGPT require a lot of computing power and data. They use large text sources like books and news articles. There are concerns about bias and privacy, as biases from the training data can be present in the model's responses. Researchers are working to address these issues.

ChatGPT is built on a deep neural network called a Transformer, a common choice for language processing tasks. The Transformer architecture uses an encoder and decoder to understand and generate text. It also uses selfattention mechanisms to focus on different



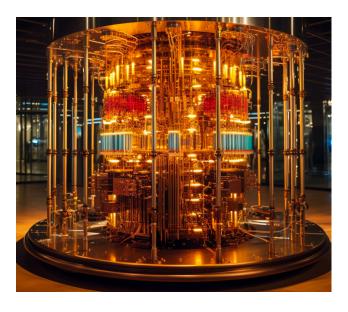
parts of the input. ChatGPT's variation of the Transformer is specifically designed for language generation.

Quantum Computing



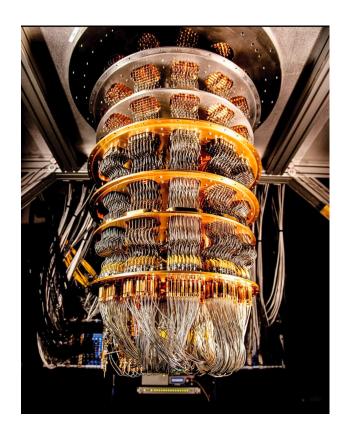


Introduction

What is Quantum Computing?

Quantum Computing incorporates ideas from computer science, math, and physics to solve complex problems quickly. Regular computers use bits for operations, while quantum computers use qubits. Qubits can be 0 or 1 and have a special state called "superposition," allowing them to be both 0 and 1 at the same time. Superposition is handy because it makes processing large amounts of data much faster. For example, while regular computers operate with ones and zeros one by one, quantum computers can check four scenarios at once with just 2 qubits. Superposition immensely decreases the processing time of a computer, making it extraordinarily efficient.

2022 Nobel Prize and Quantum Entanglement

In 2022, the Nobel Prize in physics went to three physicists Alain Aspect, John F. Clauser and Anton Zeilinger for their work on quantum technology, focusing on quantum entanglement. This phenomenon connects particles in the quantum state. This simply means that when two particles become entangled they remain connected even when they are separated by immense distances; by observing the behavior of one particle in the entangled state, you can accurately predict the behavior of the other particle non dependent of the distance that separates the particles. These physicists showed evidence of this "spooky action at a distance," as Einstein liked to call it. Quantum entanglement helps us understand particles' behavior, interconnection between them, and impacts they play on each other. The consist of groundbreaking experiments contributions of these physicists demonstrating entanglement, the breakthroughs in understanding its implications, and utilizing it for practical purposes in the future.

Companies in Quantum Computing

Big companies like IBM, Google, Microsoft, and Intel utilize quantum computing for research. IBM has created QisKit, a software for making quantum algorithms and running experiments. Amazon's "Braket" is another service for accessing quantum hardware and simulators. Companies explore quantum computing for research, application development, and education. They look into how it can help in finance, healthcare, drug discovery, and more. IBM and Amazon create educational resources, and universities offer courses on quantum physics too. With more applications such as these and a bigger understanding of quantum computing, we can better incorporate quantum computing into real world applications.
